### The Pastor's Pen...



"For I was hungry, and you gave me something to eat; I was thirsty, and you gave me something to drink; I was a stranger and you welcomed me in...Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me." [Matthew 25:35, 40]

The meaning of the phrase "refugee crisis" can be hard to grasp – until you see the photographs. A Syrian toddler, dead on a Turkish beach, after the boat in which his family was attempting to flee to Europe capsized at sea. Desperate families crowding a Hungarian train station, their children sleeping on floors and sidewalks, fearing Hungary will intern them in sinister-sounding "camps." Greek tourism towns filling with tents and with humanitarian workers, to accommodate the rickety boats of refugees that arrive daily at the shores.

Today, more than 19 million people have been forced to flee their home countries because of war, persecution, and oppression, and every day an estimated 42,500 more join them. Many, though not all, head for Europe which is why the crisis there can appear most acute.

There are, as I understand it, two layers to this crisis and why it has grown so dire. The first is the sometimes-overlapping web of wars and crises that has forced millions of people from their homes in the Middle East, sub-Saharan Africa, and elsewhere. These conflicts opened, ever so slightly, a previously closed route to Europe where the refugees appear on television and now receive global interest.

The second, and less discussed reason, is the increasingly anti-refugee politics in Western and other wealthy countries that are best suited to take them. Fear over the effects of immigration and long-held ideas about national identity are driving political decisions that contribute to the crisis. The result is that at a time when more people than ever need help, wealthy countries are more reluctant to help them – putting thousands or millions of innocent refugee families in peril.

The biggest driver of the crisis is Syria. Four million people, nearly one fifth of Syria's population, have fled the country since the war began in 2011. It's not hard to understand why: Bashar al-Assad's regime targets civilians ruthlessly, even resorting to the use of chemical weapons; ISIS subjects Syrians to murder, torture, crucifixion, sexual slavery, and other appalling atrocities; and other groups such as Jabhat al-Nusra have tortured and killed Syrians as well.

Most of these Syrian refugees end up in underfunded and crowded camps in neighboring countries. But seeing little future for their families in the camps, and knowing they may never be able to return home, many have decided to set out on the dangerous and uncertain journey for a better life in Europe.

But it's not just Syria. Older, longer-running conflicts have displaced 1.1 million refugees from Somalia and 2.59 million from Afghanistan. Many families in Eritrea are fleeing the dictatorship there that is sometimes called Africa's own North Korea. In Myanmar, a Muslim minority group known as the Rohingya has endured brutal violence and ethnic cleansing, sometimes with the tacit support of the Myanmar government. Fleeing Rohingya made headlines in recent months after thousands became stranded at sea, marooned in dangerous boats because neighboring countries refused to take them in. Meanwhile, in Central America, gang violence and lawlessness made thousands of families so desperate for their children's safety that they sent those children on a perilous journey north toward what they hoped would be safety in the United States. Many of their futures remain uncertain.

This summer, the European Union, the United States, and Kuwait respectively pledged \$1.2 billion, \$507 million, and \$500 million for aid to refugees. That's a good start, but still far short of the \$5.5 billion in aid the United Nations says is needed for the European refugees and the \$2.9 billion needed for displaced Syrians within Syria.

Truly, the numbers are overwhelming. So many displaced people. So much money needed to help them. It's easy to throw up our hands and ask, "What can I do about it?" Not one of us can fix this problem or alleviate all the suffering out there; but each one of us can make a difference.

Jesus speaks metaphorically of a King who commends those who helped the hungry, the thirsty, and the stranger. And Jesus sums up his narrative with the words "when you did it for <u>one</u> of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did it for me." Not all of them, mind you, but at least one hungry person, thirsty person, or alien person. Not all. Just one. Each of us has the means to help one other person, to hold another in prayer, or to educate ourselves about the plight of the refugees.

Jesus calls on each of us to do what we can do to ease the trouble of another. It's not really asking that much when we consider how God went to bat for us when we were strangers: Abraham traveled to a strange land; Joseph and his family were aliens in Egypt; God brought the Israelites out of slavery in Egypt and into the Promised Land (which was filled with Canaanites); the disciples spread out into foreign lands and cultures; and the Gospel of Jesus expanded to include Cornelius (a Roman soldier), Lydia (a Turkish merchant), and Aquila and Priscilla (Jews living in Rome). God calls on us to have a special care for the widow and the orphan and the alien in our midst.

So what can we do? Lots of things. Just do something! I developed a R-E-F-U-G-E-E response list to help you:

**Reflect**. Who among us has not felt like a stranger at some point in our life? What must it be like to be uprooted from your home and way of life? Think about a time when you traveled outside of the United States: how did it feel to be a stranger in a strange land? As you reflect on the situation of the refugees, consider what your compassionate response will be.

**Educate** yourself about the current refugee crisis. Watch the television news, listen to the political pundits on the radio, get more information off the web, and be able to speak knowledgably about this unfolding situation.

**Facebook**. Weigh in on this issue and raise awareness among your friends and contacts. Follow the news agencies coverage and our denomination's responses via Facebook. Keep the conversation going; don't let the refugees be forgotten.

**Use Your Freedom**. We live in a country of free speech and free elections with representatives who should listen to their constituents. Use the political power you have! Write to politicians urging them to do something to help. Sign petitions urging Congress and the President to spend more on aid or allow refugees with legitimate reasons to enter our country. Lobby for action.

**Give**. Both the Presbyterian Church (USA) and the United Church of Christ have sites established to contribute to the cost of feeding and housing the refugees. The easiest way to give is online at <a href="www.pda.pcusa.org">www.pda.pcusa.org</a> (Presbyterian Disaster Assistance) or <a href="www.cwsglobal.org">www.cwsglobal.org</a> (Church World Service). If you prefer, you may write a check to The Federated Church with 'Refugee' on the memo line and we will send it on to the appropriate agency.

**Entreat.** Pray for all who have fled their home seeking safety in unfamiliar lands that they may find courage, strength, peace and welcome. And pray that those who provide shelter may find courage, strength and not be overwhelmed in their outreach.

**Exhibit Hope.** One person can make a difference. And with God all things are possible. Working together we can provide what God's children need: food, water, shelter, safety, love, and hope.

I don't usually weigh in on political issues, but the condition of 19 million refugees who need the basics of food, water, and shelter is worthy my attention and your attention.


### **Kids Club**



Doesn't volunteering give you a wonderful feeling? Well, here is an opportunity for you! I have been doing the volunteer job of adding up all of the grocery receipts for three years now. I will be retiring from this on December 31, 2015. Please consider volunteering! You can let Elizabeth or myself know about your decision to help.

Please bring in your Sunmart and Service Food receipts. **Service Food receipts** from June 8 through Sept. 6, 2015 totaled \$22,880.39 and are given to the public schools to help them with educational needs. The running total for the **Sunmart receipts from Nov.** 14, 2013 to Sept. 6, 2015 is \$38,623.01, working toward the goal of \$150,000. 

### **Parish Nursing Notes**

I am pleased to have Dr. Jill Iverson of Fergus Falls Chiropractic as a guest writer this month! The following article is from her July newsletter.



It is back-to-school time, and with that brings stress on the spines of kids from overweight back-packs. Too much weight will cause the spine to compress and lean over its natural center of gravity, causing stress and pain to the neck and lower back.

There are a few simple tips to help prevent backpack injuries:

- 1. Wear both shoulder straps evenly to properly distribute backpack weight.
- 2. Get the correct size backpack for your child. Do not pack too much weight.
  Follow the guidelines set by the American Chiropractic Association, American Physical
  Therapy Association, and American Academy of Orthopedic Surgeons:

Weight of Child in pounds	Maximum backpack weight
60	5
60-75	10
75-100	15
100-125	18
125-150	20
150-200	25

- 3. The backpack should not extend below the lower back
- 4. Lighten the load and put the heaviest items in first, keeping them close to the body.
- 5. Lift the backpack with your legs and place it on one shoulder strap at a time.
- 6. Choose a quality backpack that has wide, well-cushioned shoulder straps with a lumbar support/padding.
- 7. Do not leave backpacks on the floor where they can become a tripping hazard.

If your child is experiencing any discomfort, remember that they, too, can get adjusted. Babies and children respond very well to chiropractic care throughout life to help alleviate biomechanical issues and to encourage proper posture as their spines are growing.

TAKE HOLD OF THE LIFE THAT REALLY IS LIFE

It seems if one attaches the word 'free' to a few select words people are bound to sit up and take notice. I mean, who doesn't welcome the implications and benefits accompanying word pairings such as tax free, interest free, worry free, debt free, and trouble free?

So, based on this idea of 'free' being 'good', when the Apostle Paul invites us to 'live free' in the last chapter of 1 Timothy, there might be a certain favorable appeal to this invitation. However, the challenge and the opportunity come when we set about exploring exactly what this might mean in congregational life.

The biblical notion of freedom holds two distinct but related trajectories in tension simultaneously: freedom <u>from</u> and freedom <u>for</u>. The people of Israel were set free from enslavement in Egypt by the action of God. This same God made them free for a covenant relationship that purposed them to observe the Torah and to be a "light to the nations." Through the life, teaching, death, and resurrection of Jesus, God set creation free from the power of sin and death. This same God has set followers of Christ free for life and witness to the good news of the reign of God.

Unlike our common notions of freedom as something to be won and fought for, something that gives us license to do whatever we want, or even something enshrined in the Constitution, the biblical and theological understanding of freedom is that of a gift, secured and offered by God. It involves rescue and sending, deliverance, and missional purpose. Living free, then, has to do with inquiring from what we need to be rescued and delivered as well as for what we are purposed to be and to do as Christians and as congregations.

This, then, is our stewardship emphasis: what do we need to be freed <u>from</u>, in order to be free <u>for</u> what God has in mind for us as Christians and as The Federated Church? What bad habits must we jettison in order to embrace the new direction God is leading us? What programs must we let go in order to embrace other programs that better meet the needs of our community? What faulty ideas about 'our money' must we re-think in order to see everything as 'God's gift'?

Over the next month we'll be exploring what it means to Live Free in Christ through sermons and Bible studies. And we encourage you to ask about your own life: what do I need to be rescued from in order to be free for what God intends for me?

Consecration Sunday is October 25<sup>th</sup> with worship at 10AM and a congregational brunch to follow. Pastor Ed Morgan will share some thoughts about living free that morning, and you'll be invited to live free by making your commitment to our congregation's ministries and missions in 2016.
