Pastor's Pen

"What has been will be again, what has been done will be done again; there is nothing new under the sun." Ecclesiastes 1:9

Dante Alighieri, author of The Divine Comedy, died 700 years ago this year. The Florentine author witnessed firsthand his era's political chaos, civil unrest, divided family loyalties, internal warfare, immigration issues, and the construction of walls. He experienced poor urban air quality and climate change, disease and pandemics, great wealth and abject squalor. Speaking truth to power about these issues so upset the rulers of Dante's day, that they banished him for life. He lost his home, his wife, and most of his possessions.

If all of this sounds familiar, it is because, as Ecclesiastes states: "What has been will be again, what has been done will be done again; there is nothing new under the sun" (1:9).

Drawing on his personal experiences, Dante used his literary talents to promote his belief in a better world. He dedicated the last two decades of his life to composing something that would transcend the problems of his day and be of benefit all humankind. Dante's Comedy is divided into three parts: Inferno, Purgatory, and Paradise.

In the first past, Inferno, a traveler named Dante descends to the bottom of Hell to recognize the true nature of sin and its consequences. Here Dante sees "the damned" who have no hope of redemption. In the second part, on the mount of Purgatory, Dante becomes more introspective and rids himself of had habits and sinful tendencies (represented by the seven deadly sins of pride, envy, anger, sloth, avarice, gluttony, and lust). He acknowledges that to progress he must confess and change his ways. Finally, in Paradise, the humbled Dante, freed from sin, speeds through the heavens to experience a vision of God which qualifies him to become a Christian poet and to share a message of warning and hope with a deeply troubled world. As Dante looks down at earth, he perceives the pettiness of most disagreements and recognizes the blessing for those who put aside their own follies and focus on lessening the burden of others.

Writing about Dante's Comedy in an article entitled, "We Are Living in Dante's Inferno. Here's Our Way Out," Madison Sowell, professor emeritus of Italian and comparative literature at Brigham Young University, poses several questions of Dante and of us: "What is my role in this chaos, conflict or war of words? Is my own pridefulness or enviousness partially at fault or even completely to blame? Am I too quick to anger, too lazy to take an active role in solving problems or too greedy to share of my own abundance to aid others?"

Sowell, echoing Jesus, says that the person who most benefits from the pilgrim's experiences must embrace the virtues that oppose the Seven Deadly Sins: humility, altruism, forgiveness, active engagement in problem-solving, generosity, and brotherly-sisterly love.

As our world's problems continue into 2021, Dante's epic, if read all the way through, teaches that there is a better and more hopeful way. Channeling Dante, Sowell encourages us all to read widely and open our minds to more than one news source or point of view; to recognize how breaking the law – God's or human – leads to corruption; to personal responsibility for our part, acknowledge when we are wrong, and seek to make amends; to adopt long-term views and prioritize what matters most.

Dante calls his work a comedy because it starts on an unhappy note, with the traveler lost in the dark wood of error; but it ends happily with a vision of the good, the beautiful, and the true. Our choices affect the trajectory of our lives. We can choose to make things better, instead of worse. We can act in ways that promote personal and communal well-being, instead of seeking selfish gain. We can speak words of affirmation, instead of hate. We can do justice, love kindness, and walk humbly with our God (Micah 6:8), recognizing our inter-connectedness in this world, instead of going it alone.

As Sowell sums it up: "We may feel at times that we are living in a Hell parallel to Dante's, but we need not take up permanent residence."

Let each of us, as we are able, take up Dante's challenge to improve our small corner of the world. Blessings as you go! Pastor Doug

Christian Education and Youth Rev. Karen Anderson

After a hiatus in November and December, our children's and youth activities resumed in-person with great success in mid-January! Everyone is VERY HAPPY to be back together again, learning and growing together! During the interim time, middle school and high school youth met periodically for outdoor activities such as skating and sledding, which we hope to continue doing as weather permits through February. We usually decide to organize with short notice, and text one another a time and place. Sunday school kicked off with all our teachers returning and kids in each class. Kidz Club began with a strong start as well, with most of our fall/winter participants back in routine. 9th grade confirmation was happy to be back meeting face-to-face for class, and senior high youth picked up where we left off in November with an active and committed group.

Sunday School: Our Sunday school classes, for K-6 and 7-12 continue to meet each week following worship. Our elementary students and teachers carry on the theme "Who is God", and the older youth have a different unique lesson each week.

Kidz Club: Beginning in February we will start a series entitled "God Speaks!" Exploring ways in which God communicates with his people. We wanted to continue our year on the theme of God, and believe this will be an important focus. Each week we will study a story from the Bible that shows God connecting with individuals. Hopefully this will encourage our participants to develop the practice of listening for God!

Middle School: Our middle school group continues to meet each week by Zoom during mid-afternoon on Wednesdays. With the different school schedule this year we are unable to get our kids to the church as they are not in school on Wednesdays. As the winter and spring progresses we hope to continue meeting periodically in person for special activities and figure out ways to have in person youth group!

Senior High: Our senior high meets each week in person on Wednesdays at our regular time (7:30pm-9) for learning, fellowship, service projects, and games. We will also continue to organize periodic special activities outside of the regular meeting time.

Women's Bible Study: The women's Bible study is beginning a study of the Gospel of John and continues to meet on Tuesdays at 11:30 am via Zoom, which we have done since March of 2020.
